

Open Value Post & Go stamps from Post Office kiosks

The introduction of NCR Post & Go kiosks in post offices from 14 February 2014 allowed the printing of Open Value stamps tailored specifically to individual letters, packages and parcels. There are currently (March 2020) about 650 NCR kiosks distributed among about 230 post offices. The NCR kiosks are equipped with a weighing unit, which allows customers to determine the weight class of the item and to choose the postal service required from a series of menus on a touch screen. The requested Open Value stamp is then thermally printed at the point of sale on a self-adhesive gravure-printed Post & Go stamp design. Initially, stamps with the Machin head design in olive and blue were used for first-class and second-class values, respectively, but subsequently pictorial designs were available for Open Value stamps.

Open Value inscriptions

Two Open Value stamps for the 2nd-class Standard letter service obtained from an NCR kiosk in Cambridge City post office are shown in Figure 1 (above). The service indicator 2L is shown in the largest font and the service/VAT code (E4), the price paid (£0.56), the weight of the item (0.008 kg) and the four-part numerical datastring are arranged below in different fonts. This layout is similar on all Open Value Post & Go stamps, although some service indicators are in two parts with the second part in a lower font on the same line as the service/VAT code (see images in Figure 2). A difference between the two stamps shown in Figure 1 is the inclusion of CB23 on the stamp on the left. CB23 is the first part of the postcode of the destination address for the purchased stamp, and this is printed on the stamp if proof of postage is requested. The first part of the postcode of the destination address is also printed on stamps for Royal Mail Confirmed, Guaranteed or Parcelforce services to the UK and Channel Islands (see images in Figure 2). The postcode is absent if proof of posting is not requested or if the stamp is destined for an overseas address.

A full list of service indicators, with the Royal Mail and Parcelforce services they represent, is given in Table 1, and images of Post & Go stamps with all the different service indicators are shown in Figure 2.

The Service/VAT code


The two-character code on the second line of the Open Value inscription (E4 in Figure 1) is made up of an upper-case letter indicating the Royal Mail service code (the same as used originally on Horizon labels produced by counter staff in post offices) and a single number indicating the VAT status of the service. For Royal Mail services, VATexempt services are indicated by the number 4, zero-rated services by 5, and standard-rate VAT services by 6. For Parcelforce services, the twocharacter code is made up of two numbers; the first number is always 7, and the second number is 8 for zero-rated services, or 9 for standard rate VAT services. The two-character codes on Open Value stamps for all Royal Mail and Parcelforce services are given in Table 1.

Royal Mail UK Standard and Confirmed (signed for) services to addresses in the UK are VATexempt and have the number 4, whereas identical services to the Channel Islands are zero-rated for VAT and have the number 5. The cost of these services to addresses in the UK and the Channel Islands is identical. For Royal Mail UK Guaranteed (special delivery) services, the SD1 service is VAT-exempt (code 4) to UK addresses and zerorated (code 5) to Channel Island addresses, so the costs are identical. However, the other special delivery services (SD1 Sat G'tee, SD9 and SD9 Sat G'tee) are charged standard-rate VAT (code 6; currently 20%) for UK delivery, but are zerorated (code 5) for delivery to the Channel Islands and are therefore cheaper for mail to the Channel Islands.

For Royal Mail International Standard (A), Tracked & Signed (ITS) and Signed (IS) services, delivery to addresses in Europe is VAT-exempt (code 4),



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whereas delivery to other locations worldwide is zero-rated (code 5). For International Tracked (IT and Airsure AAX) services, delivery to addresses in the EU is charged standard-rate VAT (code 6), whereas delivery to non-EU European countries (such as Switzerland) and to other locations worldwide is zero-rated (code 5).

Parcelforce Worldwide is the division of Royal Mail that handles large parcels not exceeding 1.5m long and 30kg in weight to be delivered within the UK and worldwide. The Parcelforce services all include VAT at the standard rate (code 9), except the globalvalue service (PS) to the Channel Islands which is zero-rated (code 8).

The datastring

The datastring is the four-part numerical code on the bottom line of printing on Post & Go stamps from NCR kiosks. The datastring on the stamps in Figure 1 identifies the post office (008113 Cambridge City), the kiosk (71), the session number (079565) and the number of each stamp produced in that session (13 or 14). The form of the datastring on Open Value stamps is the same as printed on Non-Value Indicated (NVI) stamps from NCR kiosks. Lists of post office branch codes, the first six numbers of the datastring, are available on the MBPC website or on Stuart Leigh's Post & Go website (http:// postandgochecklist.yolasite.com). The latter site also lists the number of NCR kiosks at each post office site. The kiosks can be identified from the pair of numbers on the Post & Go stamp or from the receipt obtained on paying for the stamp; they are numbered from 67 upwards. Cambridge City post office has five NCR kiosks numbered 67, 68, 69, 70 and 71. The other numbers in the datastring give the session number (the number of times the NCR kiosk has been used since it was installed) and the number of the stamp printed in that session (numbered from 01 upwards).

Changes to service indicators and Post & Go designs

All but one of the stamps used to illustrate the 45 different service indicators available on Open Value Post & Go stamps from NCR kiosks in Figure 2 are Machin head stamps. Most of the images are of stamps obtained soon after the availability of the services on NCR Post & Go kiosks. However, stamps for the Parcelforce globalexpress service were apparently not available from 28 February 2014 when stamps for

the other Parcelforce services became available. The illustrated stamp with the GX service code is a Hibernating Animals pictorial stamp, depicting a brown long-eared bat hibernating, first issued on 14 November 2016. It is currently not clear when stamps for the Parcelforce globalexpress service first became available on NCR kiosks. Open Value inscriptions may be expected on all Post & Go stamp designs, although they will be considerably rarer on the Birds of Britain, Farm Animals and Freshwater Life series of stamps. These stamps were issued in 2010-2014 before the introduction of NCR kiosks, and were intended for use in Wincor Nixdorf Post & Go kiosks, which were unable to produce Open Value stamps. Relatively few rolls of stamps of these series were used in NCR kiosks in a small number of post offices.

Open Value stamps with the AAX and A ISF service indicators were available for a period of only 4 weeks, from the introduction of NCR kiosks on 28 February 2014 to 29 March 2014 before changes in the postal rates. On 31 March 2014, the Airsure and International Signed For services were renamed International Tracked and International Signed, respectively, and the International Tracked and Signed service was introduced. The AAX and A ISF service indicators are known only on Machin head stamps.

One year later, on 30 March 2015, Royal Mail introduced a new size class of Large Letter for international mail, resulting in new service indicators on Open Value stamps from NCR kiosks. The 'Lg.Letter' inscription was added to the International Standard (A), International Tracked & Signed (ITS), International Tracked (IT) and International Signed (IS) service indicators (see Table 1 and Figure 2).

The next major change in Open Value stamps from NCR kiosks occurred in autumn 2016 when new larger self-adhesive labels, similar to Horizon labels, were introduced to help with increased mechanisation of Royal Mail services.

These labels were placed in the third, previously unused, printer port of the NCR kiosks and were printed with machine-readable two-dimensional barcodes for the following Royal Mail services: parcels (2SP, 2MP, 1SP, 1MP and signed for), UK and International special services (SD1, SD9, ITS, IT and IS), and 2nd-class, 1st-class and Airmail

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services for letters weighing more than 100g. These changes started in late September 2016 and the roll-out was reported to have been complete by the end of October 2016, although there were delays in implementation in some post offices. This resulted in a considerable decrease in the number of Royal Mail services for which Open Value stamps were available. Following the introduction of the 2D-barcoded labels, the only Royal Mail services for which Open Value stamps were available, and then only for letters less than 100g, were the 1st and 2nd-class Standard Letter (1L and 2L), 1st- and 2nd-class Confirmed Letter (1L signed for and 2L signed for), 1st- and 2ndclass Standard Large Letter (1LG and 2LG), and International Standard Letter and Large Letter (A Letter and A Lg.Letter) services.

Post & Go stamps for Parcelforce services were unaffected by the introduction of the larger Horizon-like labels. All Parcelforce services required large specific bar-coded labels to be attached to the parcels and scanned by the NCR Post & Go kiosk before the Open Value stamps were printed, and this procedure was unchanged following the introduction of the 2D-barcoded labels. All Post & Go stamp issues loaded in the first-class printer port of NCR kiosks would be

available for Open Value stamps for Parcelforce services. However, Open Value stamps for Parcelforce services are rarely seen; they constitute a very small proportion of the mail franked at NCR kiosks and many of the parcels franked are sent overseas.

The change to the use of 2D-barcoded labels, rather than stamps, for a majority of Royal Mail services in autumn 2016 restricted the availability of Open Value stamps on various Post & Go issues. Open Value stamps for Royal Mail services from April 2014 to autumn 2016 should be available for all Post & Go issues from Symbolic Flowers (FDI 17 September 2014) to Ladybirds (FDI 14 September 2016). Following the change, only a restricted set of eight Open Value stamps for Royal Mail services were available on Post & Go issues from Hibernating Animals (FDI 14 November 2016) to Mail by Bike (FDI 12 September 2018), plus any 2018- or 2019-dated Machin head or Winter Greenery Post & Go stamps. Open Value stamps for all Parcelforce services continue to be available on all Post & Go designs loaded in the NCR kiosks.
